

General

Most rescue dogs end up there through no fault of their own. They often end up here due to bad decisions, such as being acquired with insufficient preparation and research. Every dog up for placement is screened to the best of our ability to ensure the dog is healthy and temperamentally sound. The Rescue Program neither accepts nor places any unsafe dog. For the dogs that have been abused or neglected, many new owners report the dogs are especially attentive and loving.

How much does it cost?

Adoption fees vary as each dog's journey from the Rescue Program to placement is unique. The Rescue Program's costs include but are not limited to spay/neuter, vaccinations, heartworm testing and treatment.

Where are the dogs?

A dog may be in a temporary foster home, a shelter, or still living with their original owner.

Do you transport?

The Rescue Program does not offer transportation services. All costs of getting the dog to its new home will be borne by the adopting Party.

What happens if...?

Our matching process usually results in lifelong placements. We understand life happens, if a dog does not work out in his new home, the dog must be returned to the Rescue Program. Most importantly, any dog we have placed may be returned **anytime**.

How do I get started?

Visit our <u>website</u> to find and complete an application. Please email it to the Rescue Coordinator. After your application is reviewed and if approved, you will be notified when an appropriate dog is available. The last step is to pay the adoption fee and sign the adoption contract.
